As soon as one has registered, she becomes a member of the Association and thereby assumes the responsibility of conducting herself, to the best of her ability, according to the rules and regulations laid down by this Association.

The rules and regulations of the school have been made after much consideration for the betterment of the school and for the benefit of the individual. When you enter a school with a number of other girls, you must become used to some rules that you did not have in your homes. In order to become a success at Montreat, you must become a successful citizen of the school. Carry out the rules to the best of your ability; you will find that they are all for the best.



# Constitution of the Student-Faculty Government Association

We, the students of Montreat College, under the authority of the President of the College and the members of the faculty, in order to assume individual community responsibility in the life and conduct of the students, do ordain this constitution of the Student-Faculty Government Association.

## ARTICLE 1

The name of this organization shall be: "The Student-Faculty Government Association of Montreat College."

## ARTICLE 2

The purpose of this organization shall be to afford the students, upon the voluntary assumption of individual and community responsibility, an opportunity not only to learn to observe the ordinary rules and proprieties of life but also to cultivate that general bearing becoming a Christian.

## ARTICLE 3

By enrolling at Montreat College, all students automatically become members of this organization and so agree to uphold to the best of their ability the policies of the organization.

## ARTICLE 4

The Senate, the joint session of Congress, and the student body meetings are to be conducted by the order and rules of business of Parliamentary Law in Roberts Rules of Order.

## ARTICLE 5

### Section 1. The President.

A. The chief executive shall be the president. She shall be elected in March from the incoming senior college class and shall have served previously as a member of the joint session of Congress. She shall be elected from three nominees determined by a straw vote of the student body and approved by the Cabinet. To be elected

she must receive a majority of all votes cast. She shall assume the responsibility of her office on the first of April.

B. The duties of the President.

1. She shall preside over all the meetings of the student body, the Cabinet, the Senate, the joint session of Congress, and the House of Representatives.

2. She shall exercise all powers and authorities as designated by the Student Faculty Cabinet annually.

Section 2. The Vice President.

A. She shall be elected in March at the time designated by the Cabinet and from nominees selected by the Cabinet from a straw vote of the student body.

B. The duties of the Vice President.

1. She shall assume the duties of the president in the absence or incapacity of this officer.

2. She shall be responsible for the routine work of the classification system.

3. She shall be responsible with her house president for the conduct of her dormitory in so far as such responsibility is placed upon her.

Section 3. The House Presidents.

A. A house president shall be elected for each dormitory. These elections shall take place in March at the time designated by the Cabinet. The house presidents shall be elected from nominees selected by the Cabinet from a straw vote of the student body and shall be from the incoming senior college class.

B. The duties of the house presidents.

1. She shall be responsible for the conduct of her dormitory in so far as that duty devolves upon her.

2. She shall check the dormitory book for all absences.

3. She shall advise and supervise the monitors in her dormitory.

Section 4. The Secretary.

A. The Secretary is to be elected by the Senate from nominees submitted by the Cabinet.

B. Duties of the Secretary.

1. She shall record the proceedings of the Cabinet,

the Senate, the House of Representatives, the joint meetings of Congress, and the student body.

2. She shall post all regulations made by the Student-Faculty Government Association.

3. She shall notify, in writing, students whose conduct has necessitated some special action by the Cabinet.

4. She shall give notice of all called meetings of the Cabinet or other bodies.

## ARTICLE 6

### LEGISLATIVE BODIES

#### Section 1. The Cabinet.

A. The Cabinet shall consist of the president, the vice-president, the house presidents, the secretary, the president of the Y. P. C., the president of the Athletic Association, the editor of the SUN DIAL, and the retiring student body president from April until Commencement.

B. The Cabinet shall meet with such members of the Faculty as the dean names.

C. The Student-Faculty Cabinet shall formulate the general policies of conduct and act upon such problems of discipline as come within its scope.

#### Section 2. The Senate.

A. The Senate shall consist of the Cabinet, the president of the senior college class, the president of the junior college class, the senior high school president and one or more members from the college and high school classes.

B. Each class shall elect its senator at the beginning of the school year.

C. The duties of the senators shall be to convey to the Senate or Congress the suggestions or opinions of their respective classes and to return to their respective classes the reflections of the Senate or Congress, and to check the activity cards of the members of their classes.

#### Section 3. The House of Representatives.

A. The House of Representatives shall consist of a representative from each hall. The representatives shall be elected each four weeks by the Congress.

B. Duties of the representatives shall be determined

partly by the hall which they represent, whether college or high school. For the most part it shall be helping the students on the hall conduct study and quiet hour according to the regulations.

#### Section 4. The Congress.

A. Congress consists of the Senate and the House of Representatives.

B. Duties. Its duty shall be to elect the representatives each six weeks and to present suggestions and opinions from any students.

#### Section 5. Special Instructions and Regulations for Cabinet Members, Senators and Representatives.

##### A. Cabinet.

A member of the Cabinet may be impeached and removed from office if the Faculty or Student-Faculty Cabinet agree that the officer has failed to assume her responsibilities or has not conducted herself properly.

##### B. Senate and House of Representatives.

If in the opinion of the Cabinet (as above) any senator or representative fails to assume her responsibilities or conduct herself properly she may be asked to resign.

C. If a class president or senator is unable to attend a meeting of Congress, she may send as her alternate the vice-president of her class.

D. All discussions in Cabinet, Senate and House of Representatives are confidential; this means that no matters of business are to be discussed outside of the meetings. The Dean, Assistant Dean and Student Body Presidents have the sole right to make public any decisions made in the meetings.

E. On assuming the responsibilities of office, each member of the Student Cabinet is to repeat the following pledge in the presence of the student body:

I do hereby solemnly promise before these witnesses to execute faithfully the regulations and policies of the Montreat College Student-Faculty Government Association, to uphold and maintain the dignity of the office to which I have been elected, and to perform to the best of my ability the

duties which devolve upon such an office, and to keep confidential all discussions of the respective meetings.

F. On assuming office the members of the House of Representatives shall repeat the following pledge in the presence of the Cabinet.

I do hereby solemnly promise before these witnesses to perform faithfully the duties of a monitor on the hall which I have been elected to represent.

## ARTICLE 7 CLASSIFICATION SYSTEM

### Section 1.

The Student-Faculty Government Association has adopted a classification system whereby students shall be given certain privileges according to their merit. The system is based upon 100 points divided as follows:

Grades .....	20	points
Department .....	50	"
Neatness .....	10	"
Participation .....	10	"
Attitude .....	10	"

Major and minor points are given as penalties for the abuse of regulations. These are subtracted from the "50" on department, and thus a student's rating on department is determined. "General attitude" includes attitude toward class work, toward regulations, toward the general activities of the college. "Participation" means acceptance of individual responsibility as a member of a committee, a team, a club, or any organization. "Neatness" includes the appearance of one's room in the dormitory as well as one's personal appearance.

Students who receive 90 or more points are on first class. Students who receive 85 to 89 points, inclusively, are on second. Students who receive 80 to 84 points, inclusively, are on third.

Students who receive 75 to 79 points are on fourth. Students who receive a classification below 75 are on restriction.

## The Campus.

The campus includes and is bounded by the following: the lawn in front of Alba and Anderson Auditorium to the bridge below the dam, including the tennis court; the paved road around the lake but not below the foot bridge across the dam; the road back of Gaither by the Infirmary, College Hall and to Lookout Lodge.

The extended campus has the following limits:

Main road by the store to the soccer field, the road back of the store, road by Dr. Anderson's house, Kentucky road to South Carolina Road and Graybeard Road to the second bridge.

## Privileges, Rules and Regulations

The following rules and regulations have been made as a result of some need and are not meant to be in any case mere arbitrary restraints. Some have been made that the living together of the whole group might be more pleasant and harmonious; some that studying might be easier; some for actual physical protection and safety; and some for better cooperation between the college and the homes of the students. The college feels that each student is responsible not only for observing the rules herself but for helping others observe them.

For the violation of any regulation a major or minor may be given by any faculty member, student congress member, or monitor, or if reported to the assistant dean, by any member of the student body. Violations are to be reported to the office in written form, with the name of the offender, the nature of the offense, the date and the signature of the person reporting.

# High School Regulations

## A. DORMITORY

1. Keep room in order. Rooms are inspected and graded.

2. Do not abuse furniture or attempt to remodel it.

3. Do not abuse walls by driving in nails or tacks or by using Scotch tape. Do not paste pictures or stickers on the woodwork or walls. In the Alba only three pictures are allowed in each room.

4. An electric light bulb is furnished each room and connecting bath at beginning of year. Students must buy others. Not more than two are to be used in one room at same time. Do not remove bulbs from halls and baths. Turn out lights when leaving room. 25w bulbs are not to be used in room.

5. No electric iron or other electric equipment except radio is to be used in students' rooms. Students bringing irons must use them in the Ironing Room and when not in use leave them in the house mother's supply room. No canned heat is to be used and no candles or matches.

6. Report accidents and necessary repairs to the house mother or house keeper.

7. Students are not to appear in living rooms or on halls improperly clothed. House coats may be worn on the halls but are not to be worn to the library or outside the dormitory.

8. A student is not to enter another student's room when the occupant is absent unless accompanied by a member of the faculty, a student assistant or a Cabinet member. This is to protect the visiting student in case of theft.

9. Radiators must be turned off when the windows are open. Windows must be closed when doors are open and heat on in the building.

10. Students are not to go barefoot.

11. Duty work is to be done on Sundays as well as week days.

12. Students must not sweep dust out of rooms into the halls.

## B. STUDY HALL AND QUIET HOUR

1. Dormitories must be quiet during study hall and quiet hours.

2. Students must be in their own room at 7:30 p. m. From 7:30-7:40 permission may be obtained from the teacher on duty for speaking, sharpening pencils, etc. From 7:40-8:40 there will be supervised study hall during which time students are to study **only** and with doors open. The privilege of closing the door during study hall may be obtained by meeting certain standards. Nine-fifteen to ten o'clock is for recreation and preparation for bed. At 9:55 all must be in their own rooms and quiet.

3. First class students may spend Saturday and Sunday nights in other students' rooms. Sign up with the House President before the room bell. Not more than three students are to be in one room.

4. Radios are not to be played during study hall or after recreation except on Saturday and Sunday nights. Those abusing week-end privilege by playing the radio too loudly cause their wing of the hall to forfeit the privilege for the following week-end.

5. Radios are not to be played before the first bell in the morning. Pianos are not to be played before 3:30 in the afternoon except for scheduled practices.

6. Students are not to visit each other before the rising the morning.

7. Dormitories must be kept quiet on Sunday mornings until 9:30, when the bell rings for Sunday School. Dormitories must be kept quiet on Monday mornings until 9:00.

8. Visiting in suites from 7:40-9:40 is considered the same as visiting in other rooms. Visiting in suites after light bell is considered the same as spending the night out.

### C. DINING ROOM

1. Students are to attend all meals except Sunday and Monday breakfasts. However, students may cut breakfast twice in a three weeks' term.

2. Three tardies to the dining room in one such term make one major.

3. At all times students are expected to come to the dining room properly clothed. No curlers, or kerchiefs, are to be worn to meals except Monday lunch.



4. Prayers are held in the dining room every night after dinner except Sunday and Wednesday.

5. Students are to sit in assigned places in the dining room and are not to visit other tables before or after meals as this hinders the service.

6. The hostess (either faculty or student) is to be served first and shown the courtesy due her.

7. No food, dishes, silver, or salt and pepper shakers are to be taken from the dining room.

8. Students should not ask to be excused from the table before the announcements have been made in both dining rooms.

9. To avoid as much confusion as possible, students are not to speak to students at other tables unless it is necessary to do so in regard to an announcement. Get permission from the hostess to do this.

10. Students are asked to go directly to their assigned tables and not to congregate in the aisles, as this hinders waitresses and others entering the dining rooms.

11. Report to the dining room hostess when you are expecting a guest and purchase a meal ticket from the cashier.

#### D. CAMPUS

1. Students may walk on the extended campus in groups of two by signing out.

2. Permission to visit in Montreat must be obtained from the house mother; permission to visit or shop in Black Mountain must be obtained from the assistant dean.

3. If not on an organized hike students must obtain permission from the house mother to walk **off the extended campus**. There must be at least **four** in such a group.

4. When going away from college for week end, sign up at desk of assistant dean by Thursday, if possible, before the week end is taken. Written permission from parents or guardians must be on file and should be sent directly to the office. Unless special arrangements are made before leaving, students are expected to return from week end visits by 7:00 Monday night. Students who do return late without an excuse receive 1 minor for every hour or fraction of an hour late from 7:00 until 10:00 p. m. and 1 major for every hour or fraction of an hour after 10:00. Students may spend two week ends away from

college each semester. They may go to Asheville in a group four times each semester. **If the Asheville trips are not made**, students living near enough so that such trips do not interfere with class work may spend a third week end away from the college. At any time when leaving for a week end report to your house mother and also sign up in the dormitory book.

5. Students on first class may go to the picture show in Black Mountain Monday afternoons when such trips are arranged.

6. Trips may be made to Asheville on Mondays four times during a semester. Students must be accompanied by a school chaperon. Sign out and in the dormitory book.

7. Students may go to the Montreat Store between 2:30 and 6:00 p.m. Sign up in the dormitory book upon leaving and returning. Students are to be considerate and courteous and are not to loiter around store or go behind counters. The time out at the store is not to exceed 45 minutes.

8. Shorts are not to be worn on the campus and in the lobbies, in the Administration Building, or to the store, but only on the tennis courts, athletic fields, gymnasium and on mountain hikes and picnics.

9. On Sundays students are to remain on the immediate campus. Students desiring to take a longer hike may form in groups of not fewer than five and not more than eight. Such groups must have for a chaperon a member of the Student-Faculty Cabinet, the College Y.P.C. Council, or the College Athletic Board. These hikes may be taken during Quiet Hour, but students must leave the dormitory before Quiet Hour begins. Not more than one such group is to leave from the Lodge and not more than three from College Hall on any one Sunday.

10. Students may have "general permission" if it is the wish of their parents or guardians. This must be in writing and must be sent directly from the parent or guardian to the college office. Such permission includes receiving callers, riding with friends if mature person is in the group, having young men visitors, accepting invitations to lunch or dinner, and participating in any group activity or trip permitted by the college authorities. Stu-

dents must have a special permission to leave the campus for the week end or any part of it.

### E. MISCELLANEOUS

1. A student must make arrangements with the assistant dean before taking class "cuts."

2. All students are expected to attend Sunday School, Church, Y.P.C., and Prayer Meeting.

3. Hats must be worn to church except by choir members.

4. All senior high school girls are to wear hose to church, Asheville, and on other occasions when wearing dress shoes. Other high school students must wear hose on any occasions when wearing dress shoes.

5. Students are to dress for Wednesday night dinner and for Prayer Meeting.

6. Students expecting visitors (including "dates") should report to the assistant dean **and house mother** the names of visitors and time of expected visit.

7. Students are not permitted to go riding on Sunday afternoons except with parents or guardians. They may go out for meals if proper arrangements are made with the assistant dean.

8. Students are not to enter the Montreat Post Office or to mail letters there, but are to use the box provided for that purpose in Gaither Hall. Each student is to call for her own mail only and at the specified time and place. If at any time it is necessary to go to the Montreat Post Office, get permission from your house mother.

9. Our standards do not permit social dancing, use of tobacco in any form, or card playing. Anyone found with cigarettes or matches in her room or possession will be given five majors. Montreat Girls are not to smoke in any public places in Asheville or Black Mountain on Mondays or en route to or from either of these places any time.

10. Chewing gum is not to be used in classes or public places.

11. Three tardies to one class are equivalent to one cut and may also warrant a major.

12. Students are asked not to call or talk from the windows of dormitories.

13. Permission to make long distance calls must be obtained from the Assistant Dean (or in her absence from the House Mother). Such calls are to be made over the pay telephone. Have change ready. For patriotic reasons, do not make long distance calls unless necessary. The telephone company has asked us to "Stop! Think! . . . Help keep lines and central offices clear for war business." No calls purely for social conversation are to be made between dormitories or to the infirmary.

14. When engaged in scheduled recreational activities on the athletic fields or when on an organized hike, students need not sign in dormitory book.

15. Screaming and running or throwing water in the dormitories is not permissible. Do not loiter in the Administration Building during or between classes.

16. Sacred and classical music only are to be played on Sunday.

17. First class freshman and sophomore students may have dates twice a semester; junior and senior students three times a semester. Such callers are to be received in the living rooms of the dormitories. Callers must leave by 10:00 p.m.

18. When a student is admitted as a patient to the Infirmary she should notify the House Mother.

19. Students are not to swim or wade except by special permission.

20. Sun baths are to be taken only in appointed places.

21. Students are not permitted to trespass on private property. This includes the porches and grounds of private homes in Montreat.

22. Students making **special** trips to Asheville or Black Mountain must pay all expenses of their chaperon.

23. Students are regarded as being under the direction of the college and subject to the rules and regulations, on all trips to Black Mountain and Asheville.

# College Regulations

## A. DORMITORY

1. Keep room in order. Rooms are inspected and graded.

2. Do not abuse furniture or attempt to remodel it.

3. Do not abuse walls by driving in nails or tacks or by using injurious tape. Do not paste pictures or stickers on the woodwork or walls. In the Alba only three pictures are allowed in each room.

4. An electric light bulb is furnished each room and connecting bath at beginning of year. Students must buy others. Not more than two are to be used in one room at same time. Do not remove bulbs from halls and baths. Turn out lights when leaving room. 25v bulbs are not to be used in room.

5. No electric iron or other electric equipment except radio is to be used in students' rooms. Students bringing their own irons must use them in the ironing room and must leave them when not in use in the house mother's supply room. No canned heat is to be used and no tandles or matches.

6. Report all accidents and necessary repairs to the house mother.

7. Students are not to appear in living rooms or on halls improperly clothed. House coats may be worn on halls. House coats are not to be worn outside dormitory.

8. A student is not to enter another student's room when occupant is absent unless accompanied by a member of the faculty, student assistant, or cabinet member. This is to protect the visiting student in case of theft.

9. Radiators must be turned off when the windows are open. Windows must be closed when doors are open and heat on in the building.

10. Students are not to go barefoot.

11. Duty work is to be done on Sundays as well as week days.

## B. STUDY HALL AND QUIET HOUR

1. Dormitories and the library must be quiet during

study hall and quiet hour. All students remain in their room or in the library.

2. Any necessary communication between students except those in the same suite must be made by the monitor on duty.

3. Students may visit in other college dormitories during study hall only when they have written permission from their house mother. This permission is to be given to the house mother in the dormitory where student is visiting.

4. Students are to start to their rooms when the outside bell rings for study hall and are to be in their rooms when the inside bell rings. They are to go immediately to their rooms at the end of recreation.

5. Students may study together only if satisfactory arrangements are made with teachers concerned and with teacher on duty. This must be attended to before time for study hall to begin. Only two students are to be in one room.

6. First class students may spend Saturday and Sunday nights in other students' rooms. Sign up with House President before room bell. Not more than four students are to be in one room.

7. Visiting after lights out is considered as spending the night out.

8. Radios are not to be playing during study hall or after 11:00 p.m. except on Saturday and Sunday nights. Those abusing this week end privilege by playing the radio too loudly cause their wing of the hall to forfeit the privilege for the following week end.

9. Radios are not to be played before first bell in morning.

10. Radios may be used if turned low during Sunday quiet hour.

11. Students are not to visit each other before rising bell in the mornings.

12. Dormitories are to be quiet on Sunday mornings until the 9:30 bell rings for Sunday School. On Monday mornings, dormitories are to be quiet until 9:00.

### C. DINING ROOM

1. Students are to attend all meals except Sunday

and Monday breakfasts. However, first class students may cut breakfast four times in a nine weeks term.

2. Six tardies to the dining room make one major.

3. At all times students are expected to come to the dining room properly clothed. No curlers or kerchiefs are to be worn except Monday lunch.

4. Prayers are held in the dining room every night after dinner except Sunday and Wednesday.

5. Students are to sit at assigned places in dining room and are not to visit other tables during meals or after meals.

6. The hostess is to be served first and shown the courtesy due her.

7. No food, dishes, or silver are to be taken from dining room.

8. Students should not ask to be excused from tables early unless necessary.

9. Notify the dining room hostess when expecting a guest, and purchase a meal ticket from the cashier who will be stationed at the dining room door before each meal.

#### D. CAMPUS REGULATIONS

1. Students may walk on extended campus in groups of two by signing out, and for longer hikes in groups of four or more with permission from house mother and by signing out. On Sundays students are to remain on the immediate campus except for groups of five or more who wish to go for longer hikes. Any such group is to sign up and get permission from the house mother.

2. Permission to visit in Montreat must be obtained from the house mother; permission to visit or shop in Black Mountain must be obtained from the assistant dean.

3. Trips may be made to Asheville on Mondays four times during a semester. Students may go about town in groups of two, but must be accompanied to and from town by a chaperon and must meet the chaperon during the day at such times as she may designate.

4. When going away from college for week end, sign up at desk of assistant dean by Thursday, if possible, before week end is taken. Written permission from parents or guardians must be on file. This permission is to be sent directly to the college office, not through the student's

mail. Students are also to sign in dormitory book upon leaving and returning. Unless special arrangements are made before leaving, students are expected to return from week end visits by 7:00 p. m. Monday. Students who do return late from a week end visit and who do not have a sufficient excuse receive 1 minor for every hour or fraction of an hour late from 7:00 until 10:00 p. m. and 1 major for every hour or fraction of an hour after 10:00. Students may spent two week ends away from the college each semester. If the Asheville trips are **not** made, students living near enough so that such trips do not interfere with class work may spend a third week end away from college.

6. Students may go to the Montreat Store when convenient. Sign in the dormitory book when leaving and returning. Do not loiter around the store and return to the dormitory within 45 minutes after signing out.

7. Shorts are not to be worn on the campus, in the Administration Building, or to the store, but only on the tennis courts, athletic fields, gymnasium, and on mountain hikes. Skirts must be worn to and from the tennis courts, the athletic fields and the gym.

8. Students may have "general permission" if it is the wish of their parents or guardians. This permission must be sent directly from the parent or guardian to the college office. Such permission includes week end visits, having "dates," riding with friends if a mature person is in the group, receiving callers, and participating in any group activity or trip permitted by the college authorities.

#### E. MISCELLANEOUS

1. A student must make arrangements with the assistant dean before taking class "cuts."

2. All students are expected to attend Sunday School, Church, Y.P.C., and Prayer Meeting.

3. Hats must be worn to church except by choir members.

4. All college girls are to wear hose to Church, Asheville, and on other occasions when wearing dress shoes.



5. Students are to dress for dinner on Wednesday night and for prayer meeting.

6. Students expecting visitors (including "dates") should report to the assistant dean and house mother the names of visitors and time of expected visit.

7. Students are not permitted to go riding on Sunday afternoons except with parents or guardians. They may go out for meals if proper arrangements are made with the assistant dean.

8. Students are not to enter the Montreat Post Office or to mail letters there, but are to use the box provided for that purpose in Gaither Hall. Each student is to call for her own mail only and at the specified time and place. If at any time it is necessary to go to the Montreat Post Office, get permission from your house mother.

9. Our standards do not permit social dancing, card playing, or use of tobacco in any form. Anyone found with cigarettes or matches in her room or possession will be given five majors. Montreat Girls are not to smoke in any public places in Asheville or Black Mountain on Mondays or en route to or from either of these places any time.

10. Chewing gum is not to be used in classes or public places.

11. Three tardies to one class are equivalent to one cut and may also warrant a major.

12. Students are asked not to call out of the dormitory windows.

13. Permission to make long distance telephone calls must be obtained from the Assistant Dean. Unless the charges are reversed, such calls are to be made over the pay telephone. Have change ready.

14. When engaged in scheduled recreational activities on the athletic field or when on an organized hike, students need not sign up in the dormitory book.

15. Sacred and classical music only are to be played on Sunday.

16. Do not be boisterous at any time on the dormitory halls.

17. First class first year students may have dates four

times a semester; second year students six times a semester. Dates must leave by 10 p.m.

18. Students making **special** trips to Asheville must pay all expenses of their chaperon.

19. Students are regarded as being under the direction of the college and subject to the rules and regulations, on all trips to Black Mountain and Asheville.

### SPECIAL REGULATIONS FOR THIRD YEAR STUDENTS

Third-year college students are expected to observe all the general regulations with the following exceptions:

1. Lights out at 11:30.
2. During study hall, third year students may visit each other but not in a room where one of the occupants is a lower classman.
3. May go to Black Mountain or Asheville without a chaperone but must have permission from assistant dean. They must return to the campus by dinner time (6:10).
4. May go to show in Black Mountain twice a month in groups of five.
5. May have eight dates a semester.

## Special Infirmary Regulations

**Please come to the Infirmary during office hours except in cases of emergency. Office hours will be posted in each Dormitory. At night report first to your house mother and follow her instructions.**

Please report all injuries to the infirmary regardless of whether or not you think they are important.

If unable to attend meals for any reason, report to the Infirmary office as long before the meal as possible. Also if you are not able to attend classes, report immediately to the Infirmary.

Sore throat, rashes, temperature, etc., are always to be regarded as emergencies and should be reported promptly.

If put to bed in the Infirmary you will need kleenex, towel, bath-cloth, soap, pajamas, bath-robe, slippers, tooth brush and paste, and a card to write your mother. If you remain in for any length of time exceptions may be made. Other things needed must be obtained through the Infirmary Office.

When discharged from the Infirmary, please wait for your dismissal slip before leaving.

Notes for patients in the Infirmary must be put in the box in the lobby of the dining room. These are delivered two or three times each day. Please put girl's name on the outside. Packages too large for the note box must be put in the large box on the floor and plainly marked with the girl's name.

Most patients may have citrus fruits, but the nurse should be consulted before anything else is brought to the patient.

Everything going in or out of the Infirmary to or from a patient must go through the Infirmary Office.

Quiet Hour is observed every afternoon from two until four.

## The Classification System

In order that those students who prove themselves efficient and trustworthy may take advantage of all possible privileges without being restrained by the conduct of the less efficient and trustworthy, the classification system described below has been devised.

At the beginning of school all students are on first class and remain there for the first term unless some misdemeanor warrants their being placed on a lower class. College students are classified every nine weeks; senior high school every four weeks; junior, sophomore and freshman high school every three weeks.

### Privileges According To Classification

#### SPECIAL PRIVILEGES FOR STUDENTS ON THE HONOR ROLL

Those students, both high school and college, who make all "A's" and "B's" on their report cards and who receive not more than two majors are placed on the Roll of Honor for that term. During the next term such students, if they are on first class also, may have the following privileges:

1. May attend the picture show at night in Black Mountain once every two weeks in groups of five with a chaperon.
2. They may take an additional week end away from college.
3. They may have an extra "date".

Honor certificates are awarded at commencement to those students who meet the following requirements: receive an average grade of B on each subject each semester, with no term grade or exam below C (the B grade cannot be an average of two B's and a C); receive not more than five majors a semester.

Scholarship pins are awarded to those who are entitled to certificates for both college years (on the above basis), or for the last two high school years.

#### FIRST CLASS STUDENTS

First class students may have the following privileges. Items starred also require parents' permission.

1. Students on first class may go away for week ends according to such regulations.\*

2. They may go to Asheville at specified times.

3. They may go out to meals as the occasion arises. (Report to assistant dean.)\*

4. They may go to Black Mountain to the picture show or to shop on Monday afternoons.

5. They may spend Saturday and Sunday nights in other students' rooms.

6. They may have dates Saturday afternoon, Saturday night, or Sunday afternoon, and Sunday night.\*

7. They may receive other visitors.\*

8. They may go riding with mature friends, but must have a chaperon to ride with young men or girls. On Sundays students may go riding **only** with parents or guardians unless they go out for a meal.\*

### SECOND CLASS STUDENTS

Students on second class have a limited number of privileges.

1. They may go away for week end if to their homes and for some specific purpose.

2. They may go to Asheville to the Civic Music Concert or if some situation arises making such a trip necessary.

3. They may go out to meals in Montreat, or in Black Mountain if with parents.

4. They may receive visitors but may not have dates.

5. They may attend all social functions on the campus.

### THIRD CLASS STUDENTS

Students on third class have a very limited number of privileges.

1. They may attend such social affairs as sponsored by a college organization.

2. They may receive parents only as visitors.

3. They may go out once to a meal in Montreat.

4. They may go to the Montreat Store once a week.

### FOURTH CLASS STUDENTS

1. Students on fourth class must observe all regulations of third class.

2. They must observe special regulations as established for the individual cases.

### STUDENTS ON RESTRICTION

1. They must remain on the immediate campus.
2. They must give up all honors, such as class officers, etc.
3. They are not to visit students in other dormitories at any time.
4. They may have no visitors except parents.
5. They are not to attend social functions except school concerts or plays.
6. They must attend all meals.

A student may be dropped to a lower class at any time for some special misdemeanor.

It is sometimes necessary to place a student on "room restriction". The regulations for this will be posted when necessary.

It is not the policy of the school to keep on its roll those students whose classification is consistently below second class. As a rule at least 95% of all students remain on first class throughout the school year.

## Point System

Offices held by the students are valued in points. No student during the year may hold offices amounting to more than 30 points. Students whose scholastic grades are noticeably low should not undertake major offices.

## Class Cuts for College Students

Class cuts are based on grades. Not more than those indicated below are to be taken in any one subject during a **semester**:

A	-----	3 cuts
B	-----	2 cuts
C+	-----	1 cut

The grade referred to is the grade received on the report preceding the time when the cut is to be taken.

Grades lower than C+ do not warrant any cuts.

No cuts are to be taken before the end of the first four weeks; at that time a student who applies for cuts may get temporary grades from the teachers of the classes she wishes to cut, and if such grades are C+ or over she may have one cut in each of the classes.

Two excused absences from the same class cancel one cut.

For each cut taken when not due, the student's grade for that subject is lowered one letter on the next term report.

For each class cut without permission the student is given 5 majors.

A test scheduled a week ahead is not to be made up unless the teacher so desires and then only after presenting a slip from the office stating that a dollar has been paid for this privilege. Any laboratory period which needs to be made up because of a cut can be made up after the paying of \$1 to the office. Excused cuts do not require the dollar fee.

The student is responsible for making arrangements with the teacher for making up tests or other necessary assignments during excused absences within 2 weeks after she returns to classes unless the teacher rules otherwise.

Cuts are counted double the day before and after a holiday for all those except those whose trip home takes 12 hours or more after classes close and then the cuts are single for those who have not taken any cuts otherwise that semester.



## Class Cuts for High School Students

Each high school student may cut each class **once** each semester regardless of grades, though this is not recommended for those students making very low grades.

Students who make all A's and B's and who receive not more than two majors may cut one Saturday each four and a half weeks. The Saturdays which may be cut by these students will be announced later.

For each cut taken when not due, the student's grade on the subject is lowered one letter on the next term report.

For each class cut without permission the student is given 5 majors.

Students who fail as much as 40% of their class work for the year are automatically dropped from the roll for the next session.

The Young People of the Church of Montreat College is the major religious organization on the campus. Its purpose is to aid every student in Christian living by a four-fold program of worship, instruction, recreation, and service. The Y. P. C. through its activities endeavors to enrich the spiritual life of every student by giving her opportunities to participate and grow in Christian work and fellowship. By means of Sunday evening vespers, through the week activities, such as daily devotional or service projects, and by other avenues, character, initiative, and leadership are developed, enabling the students to advance in effective Christian living. The Y. P. C. strives to have students know and accept Jesus as Lord and Savior, and follow His principles at all times in daily living.

## THEME FOR THE YEAR

The Montreat College Y. P. C. has for its theme for 1945-46, "The More Excellent Way." The endeavor will be made to encourage the students to pray, to read the Bible, to think seriously, to observe the utmost reverence in the House of God, to advise with Christian friends in order that each may know what God's will is for her life, and to truly live and walk daily in His more excellent way.

The theme picture is Hoffman's "Christ and The Rich Young Ruler." The theme hymn, "Rise Up, O Men of God", is a beautiful old hymn of the church and is loved by Christian young people everywhere. The first stanza of this hymn is printed below:

Rise up, O men of God,  
Have done with lesser things;  
Give heart and soul and mind and strength,  
To serve the King of Kings.

### OBJECTIVES

#### We Believe

1. That God's will for His children is that they live a whole and complete life in close fellowship with Him;
2. That we can establish His Kingdom in all the earth by obeying His command to spread the gospel to every creature;
3. That there is need for growth in Christian living in ourselves, and for trained leadership for the sake of others;
4. That to do His will we must be faithful stewards of our ability, our time, and our money;
5. That there is need for Christian fellowship on the campus and in the larger community in which we live;

#### Therefore We Pledge Ourselves

1. To pray and study that we may show ourselves approved unto God, workmen that need not to be ashamed.
2. To increase our knowledge of home and foreign missions, and to widen our interest in service in our own community;

3. To support the educational work of the church, to provide opportunities for leadership to those on the campus, and to encourage wide religious reading for Christian growth;
4. To encourage individual and group stewardship through the use of voluntary pledges and a planned budget;
5. To attempt to meet the social needs on the campus and in the community by the encouragement of Christian friendship, by the planning of recreational activities, and by a wider application of the principles of social service wherever the need may be felt.
6. To cultivate a spirit of reverence in God's house.

### ORGANIZATION

The Y. P. C. of Montreat College is organized along the Kingdom Highways Plan of the Presbyterian Church. The emphasis, however, is not denominational. Because the student body is composed of representatives of a large number of denominations, we attempt to follow denominational lines only in our broader organization, while we seek to make our emphasis and our program of general interest to all the students.

In this organization a council acts as a "clearing house" for all plans and suggestions. The Council is composed of the president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, seven highway chairmen, the bulletin board chairman, the music chairman, the assistant vice-president, the Sunday School class presidents, and one adult adviser.

The Sunday School classes are the working units of the Y. P. C., and it is through them that the four-fold purpose of the Y. P. C. is carried out. The individual classes present Sunday vesper programs, carry out various social projects, and do any Christian service for which they see a need.

The Highways correspond to the departments of work in the church as follows: Spiritual Life and Evangelism, Foreign Missions, Home Missions, Religious Education and Publication, Christian Education and Ministerial Re-

lief, Stewardship, and Comradeship or Social Service. All of these work together to provide a well-rounded program.

The executive officers are elected by popular vote of the student body, and the rest of the council is chosen by the executive officers with the advice of adult advisers.

### ACTIVITIES

On Sunday nights the Y. P. C. has vesper services. The students plan and carry out these programs, the aim being to give an opportunity to every girl to participate. The subjects are varied, planned to fit individual tastes. Programs often are plays, pageants, song services, or discussion groups. When the weather is fine, a service is held on the lawn by the lake. At other times, services are in the worshipful atmosphere of beautiful Gaither Chapel.

One of the favorite types of programs is the candle-light service. The installation of the new council in the spring is an especially impressive example of this.

Since Montreat is the home of many missionaries and since Asheville is only a short distance away, it is easy to secure guest speakers from time to time.

In other weekly programs, an attempt is made to stimulate thinking on topics vital to intelligent Christian young people and to hold before them ideals that can be put into practice in everyday life.

#### Morning Watch

Morning Watch was started at the request of the students for the purpose of encouraging daily devotions. It is a ten minute worship service which begins at the warning bell for breakfast. When the weather permits, it is held outside. Those who attend feel that the whole day is better because of this time spent with God.

#### Prayer Service For Armed Forces

On Sunday afternoons for ten minutes just before supper, a service of prayer is held in the Prayer Room for the men and women in the Armed Forces of their country. The Highway of Spiritual Life sponsors this, and is assisted by the Sunday School classes. The Prayer Room is open at all times for those who wish to use it.

## Sunday Morning Worship Services

On special occasions, such as Rally Day, Thanksgiving, Foreign and Home Mission Days, and Children's Day, the young people often take charge of the opening worship service of the Sunday School. These services attempt to aid students in true worship and lead them into deeper and fuller Christian lives.

## Retreats

Each year the Y. P. C. Council has two retreats. They last all day, and are held out of doors, the council members cooking their own lunch over a camp fire. In the fall, they develop their plans more fully and seek inspiration and guidance for the school year before them. At the spring retreat the new council looks honestly at the work of the past year and makes plans to attempt improvement in the coming year. Often at these retreats there are week-end visitors who bring new ideas to the council. Always there is never-to-be-forgotten fellowship, which helps the council to help the student body.

## Guest Speakers

Since Montreat is the Presbyterian Conference ground, we are often able to secure the best speakers during the school year. We have the privilege of having with us from time to time eminent personages in the fields of music, medicine, education, home making, and religion.

Returned missionaries and citizens from foreign countries visiting Montreat are often our guest speakers. We are further honored in that some of these outstanding people make their homes in our midst. Thus, we daily come in contact with those who are best enabled to mold our character and give us a vision of the world's need.

## Bulletin Board

At the entrance to Gaither Chapel, there is a bulletin board belonging to the College Y. P. C. This bulletin board is one of the means of keeping the students in touch with the current work of the Y. P. C. and of challenging them with a variety of provocative and worshipful thoughts. The chairman of the bulletin board seeks to carry out this purpose by means of pictures, posters, verse, current events, etc.

## Financial Program

The financial program of the Y. P. C. is built upon two principles: training in systematic giving as an act of personal stewardship, and group expenditure of funds in keeping with our understanding of our part in the program of Christianity.

Thus each student is urged to pledge a weekly or monthly sum in keeping with her income and interest in the Y. P. C. work. A budget is prepared by the council and presented to the students for amendment or approval. This budget includes such things as Foreign Missions, Home Missions, Christian Education, and Religious Education, which are a part of the work of the church as a whole; and also a number of campus and community service activities to be planned and executed by small groups of students as the occasion and desire arise in the Sunday School classes.

## Social Service

Christian social service is an important part of the work of the Young People of the Church. Various projects provide ways for the Montreat students to turn their knowledge and good intentions into effective deeds and action. These are carried out through the Sunday School classes, and each girl is given an opportunity to participate in at least one. A few of the past worthwhile projects have been:

1. Visiting shut-ins here in Montreat.
2. Writing notes to the girls in the infirmary.
3. Making favors and gifts for the Western North Carolina Tuberculosis Sanatorium.
4. Collecting magazines and pictures for the infirmary rooms.
5. Collecting bottles for the infirmary.
6. Providing Easter egg hunt for children of the colored mission.
7. Sending baskets and other gifts to the children at the Orphanage.
8. Repairing choir music.
9. Teaching in outpost Sunday schools.
10. Making joke scrapbooks for the infirmary.



## Recreation

By wholesome recreation and fellowship the Y. P. C. seeks to aid students in Christian living. Play does a great deal to foster Christian fellowship and establish good will and friendliness on the campus, and in so doing it is as definitely "religious" as any other activity of the church. At the beginning of the year the Y. P. C. assists in welcoming the new girls, and takes part in the orientation program with a social get-together of some sort, including a special feature "The Festival of States". Other recreational activities are planned throughout the year. These provide for Christian growth and for an expression of Christian ideals. They offer Christian fun and fellowship, a worthwhile end in itself.

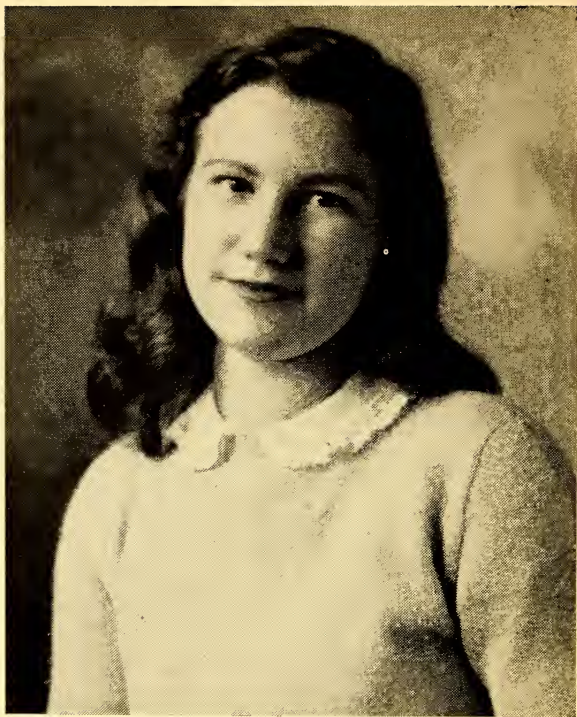
### The Life Service Group

Your athletic board is made up of the executive board, the college heads of each sport, the tribe chiefs, the high school assistant sport leaders, together with the faculty committee on athletics. The entire Athletic Association is divided into tribes. Each tribe has a chief, who looks after the interest of her tribe. We like to walk a mile, cook our supper on a rock, and enjoy all the fun of Montreat.

There are awards given in the Athletic Association, such as numerals, "M", Cheverons, and one medal to the most deserving girl. Make the "M" club your goal and enter Montreat to do the most for your Athletic Association, your school, and yourself.

# Constitution

## ARTICLE I

### Name

The name of this association shall be the Athletic Association of Montreat College.

## ARTICLE II

The purpose of this association shall be to promote interest in athletic and recreational activities among the students as a means of promoting physical efficiency, scholarship, good fellowship and sportsmanship.

## ARTICLE III

### Colors

The colors of the association shall be royal blue and gold.

## ARTICLE IV

### Membership

#### Section 1. General Membership

All students of Montreat College are members.

#### Section 2. Athletic Board

The Athletic Board shall consist of the officers, heads of sports, publicity manager, tribe chiefs, and cheerleader.

#### Section 3. The Executive Board

The Executive Board shall consist of the officers.

## ARTICLE V

### Duties

#### Section 1. President

It shall be the duty of the president to call and preside over all meetings of the Athletic Association and the Athletic Board, to appoint all committees and to be an ex-officio member of the same, and to perform all other duties incident to the office.

#### Section 2. Vice-President

It shall be the duty of the vice-president to perform the duties of the president in her absence and to serve as



chairman of the recreation committee.

### Section 3. Secretary

It shall be the duty of the secretary to keep a record of the meetings of the association, to keep a record of the meetings of the athletic board and attendance at same, and to attend to all correspondence of the association. The secretary shall also serve as recorder of points.

### Section 4. Treasurer

It shall be the duty of the treasurer to have charge of all the funds of the association and to keep a permanent account of all receipts and expenditures and to pay out money belonging to the association only on order of the president.

### Section 5. The Executive Committee

It shall be the duty of the executive committee to attend to the business of the athletic association between regular meetings.

### Section 6. The Athletic Board

It shall be the duty of the athletic board to authorize new sports, to make recommendations and suggestions regarding all affairs pertaining to the interest of the association, and to perform other duties as provided for by the Constitution.

### Section 7. Tribe Chiefs

It shall be the duty of the tribe chief to assume full responsibility of her group, and to cooperate with the head of sports in arousing interest and advertising all games of her sport.

## ARTICLE VI

### Elections

#### Section 1. Nominating Committee

A nominating committee, consisting of four members from the Athletic Board and members from the Association at large (one representative from each class), shall be appointed by the President before March 1.

#### Section 2. Officers

The nominations for President and Vice-President shall

be presented to the Association and the election shall be made by a simple majority of the vote.

### Section 3. Board Members

The Secretary, Treasurer, all heads of sports shall be elected by a two-thirds majority of the vote of the Athletic Board.

The Tribe Chiefs—Each tribe chief shall be elected by her own tribe.

The Cheerleader—shall be elected by the student body.

### Section 4. Vacancies

Vacancies in any office shall be filled by special elections or appointment.

## ARTICLE VII

### Section 1. The Association

A meeting of the Association may be called by the president at any time.

### Section 2. Athletic Board

A. There shall be one regular meeting every 3 weeks at which two-thirds of the members shall constitute a quorum.

Note: If any member is absent from more than two regular meetings, she shall not receive points for Athletic Board service.

B. At least one member of the faculty committee on athletics shall attend each of these meetings.

## ARTICLE VIII

### Quorum

### Section 1. The Association

Two-thirds of the members of the Association shall constitute a quorum.

### Section 2. The Athletic Board

Two-thirds of the student members shall constitute a quorum.

## ARTICLE IX

### Amendments

Amendments may be made to this constitution by a two-thirds majority vote of the Athletic Association.

# By-Laws

## ARTICLE I

### Regulation of Sports

#### Section 1.

Each sport shall be governed and regulated by such inter-sport regulations as shall be enacted by the Athletic Board and advisors.

#### Section 2.

Membership of teams shall be based on the following:

- a. Technical skill
- b. Health
- c. Sportsmanship

## ARTICLE II

### Seasons

There shall be three seasons of sports—according to the seasons of the year.

## ARTICLE III

### Awards

#### Section 1. Personal

Numerals, M's, and Cheverons shall be awarded to the individuals according to the point system.

#### Section 2. Medal

#### Section 3. "M" Club

The wearer of the M is automatically eligible for membership in the M Club; however she must be voted into the club.

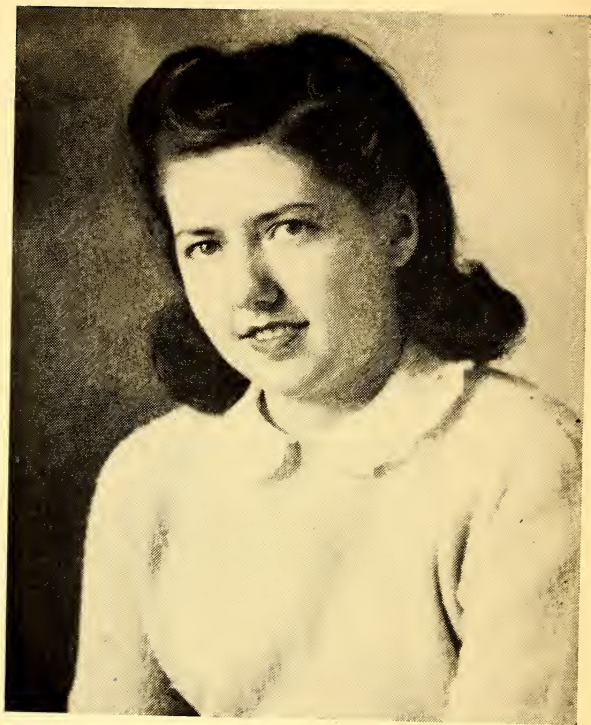

# Constitution of Student Publications

## ARTICLE I

### Section 1. Name

The name of this organization shall be The Staff of Student Publications.

### Section 2. Purpose

The purpose of this organization shall be to edit and publish a yearbook which shall be called the Sun Dial, and a student newspaper, which shall be called the Dialecte.

## ARTICLE II

### Section 1. The Editor-in-Chief

The chief executive shall be the editor-in-chief. Her duties shall be to preside over all Staff meetings, to organize and direct all activities necessary for the publications. She shall call special meetings of the Staff when deemed necessary. It shall also be her duty to represent the publications on the Student-Faculty Cabinet.

### Section 2. The Business Manager

The duties of the Business Manager shall be to take charge of the financial records. She shall also act in capacity of secretary at the meetings of the Staff.

### Section 3. The Literary Editor

The duties of the Literary Editor shall be to assist the Editor. She shall be chiefly responsible for supervising the writings of the Publications.

### Section 4. The Chairman of Production

The Chairman of Production shall be responsible for the actual production of the Dialecte.

### Section 5. Other Staff Members

The duties of other Staff members shall be to assist in the publication of the Sun Dial and the Dialecte.

## ARTICLE III

### Section 1

Before April first, the Editor shall appoint a nominating committee consisting of four members from the Staff and two members (one representing college and one High School) from the student body at large. This committee shall choose nominees for Editor-in-Chief and Business Manager, taking into consideration the results of

the straw vote by the student body, and present them to the student body for election. These shall be elected by a simple majority of the vote.

#### Section 2

The Literary Editor and the Chairman of Production shall be elected by the Staff before April first.

#### Section 3

Other members shall be elected by the Staff when considered necessary.

#### Section 4

The Editor-in-Chief, Business Manager, Literary Editor, and Chairman of Production shall assume their duties April first. However, the retiring Editor and Business Manager shall continue their duties in regard to the Sun Dial. The new Staff shall assume complete responsibility for publication of the Dialecte.

#### Section 5

One representative shall be elected by each class from a list of three nominees submitted by the Staff.

### ARTICLE IV

#### Section 1

Meetings of the Staff shall be held at stated intervals in accordance with the schedule of student activities. These meetings shall be held at a certain hour and place, as designated by the Editor.

#### Section 2.

Special meetings may be called by the Editor when deemed necessary.

### ARTICLE V

The Constitution of the Student Publications shall be amended by a two-thirds majority vote. Prospective amendments shall be presented to the Staff at the regular meeting previous to the one at which the vote shall be taken.

### BY-LAWS

1. Nominees for Editor-in-Chief and Business Manager shall be notified prior to their presentation to the student body for election.

2. Members shall be automatically dismissed from the Staff when more than two scheduled meetings are missed without reasonable excuse.

## Part V

### Other Student Organizations

#### The Stamp Club

The Stamp Club has been organized for those who are interested in collecting and studying stamps. The club meets every four weeks. At these meetings, programs are presented and stamps exchanged among the members. Miss Webb and Miss Hoyt are the sponsors.

#### "M" Club

The Monogram is the honorary athletic organization on our campus and is really the most fun of all. To become a member, all you have to do is be a good sport and go out for all athletic activities. So, come on girls, let's join the proud ranks and wear the Montreat "M".

#### Dramatics

Instead of a Dramatics Club we have a class in dramatics which meets for an hour twice a week. A study is made of the voice, the body, characterization, and stage technique. Several plays are presented during the year. A fee of 50 cents is charged. Miss Elizabeth Hoyt is teacher.

#### The United Youth Club

The United Youth Club was organized by the French, Spanish, and Latin Departments to give the foreign language students an opportunity to learn informally of the customs, language, and literature of those nations.

#### The Bio-Chemist Club

The Bio-Chemist Club is composed of those students who have at least a "B" average in Science. This club was organized to promote interest in those phases of science which ordinarily are not included in the curriculum. The programs present a wider field, and give valuable and interesting facts from science which are not included in the regular classwork.

### The Lydian Club

For this reason others than potential nurses may join if they wish.

### The Music Club

The Music Club is composed of students taking piano or voice. The purpose of the club is to embed in the students a deeper appreciation of music and to furnish opportunities for participation in musical programs, consisting of instrumental and vocal numbers. Any who are not studying music may join as associate members.

### Montreat Church Choir

The regular Montreat Church Choir, under the direction of Miss Elizabeth Woodhouse, who is voice teacher, is open to all college students with a pleasing voice and a true ear who are appreciative of cultural advantages.
